

 of quality swimming and water safety teaching programs.


AUSTSWIM Qualification Scheme


I also wish to convey the Boards thanks, appreciation and best wishes to Claire Baxter who is also leaving AUSTSWIM for a new role with a Victorian State

AUSTSWIM (ACT) have gone through some astonishing transformations over the last twelve months, with the implementation of the new National database and a whole revamp of staff, the ACT is working hard to work in conjunction with National and client expectations.

Within in the year of 2004/05 Austswim ACT has conducted 13 Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety courses producing 132 Austswim qualified teachers along with 1 Infant Aquatics course producing 13 Infant Aquatic teachers.

The NSW board and Council is pleased to advise of a number of achievements throughout the year:

- The transition to the One AUSTSWIM (Corporate structure) has been the focus of major change over the last twelve months. These changes have been successfully implemented however we continue to work closely with the national office to finalise the transition.
- Our state office is now recognised as a national Business Centre.
- We are working closely with the Royal Life Saving Society where, collectively, we are able to reach more locations than ever before.
- Our state and national offices have worked closely with Swimming NSW and the Department of Education and Training to develop bridging courses. This should see an additional 400 qualified AUSTSWIM teachers over the next 12 months.
- We developed an Ambassadors program which will provide us with high profile Australians assisting us in improving our profile. Already, dual Olympian, Justin Norris has been of great help.
- We project managed Water Safety Week with the Department of Tourism, Sport and Recreation, a fairly successful week.
- The NSW Water Safety Awards were a huge success following an overhaul of the awards. We maintained the two major awards and introduced nine new awards. More than 70 nominations were received and a very successful ceremony was conducted at Coogee Surf Life Saving Club in front of nearly 150 people. Congratulations to the many AUSTSWIM personnel that were nominated for awards.
- Our database indicates that 2,461 candidates sat the core program last year and a further 563 people attended an elective program. 710 teachers re-registered.
- Our own Awards of Excellence was a great night at the Ryde Eastwood Leagues. Thanks to the staff that had organised and conducted that evening as well as the Presenter and Teacher professional development programs earlier that day.
- Professional development programs were conducted throughout the state and a number of courses were held to attract new Presenters
- AUSTSWIM (NSW) has named five of our people as the inaugural Fellows of the Branch.
 Congratulations to Kirk Marks, Jon Donohoe, Ruth Arnold, Dawn Prowse and Norma Tickle.
- We recognise the great support and funding provided to us by the Department of Tourism, Sport and Recreation and we thank Deborah Kanak and Neville Goldspring from the Department for their guidance over the last 12 months.

AUSTSWIM NT also sent representatives to the Perth and Adelaide to the presenters workshops which was a fantastic experience and has now given the Territory much needed course presenters in all AUSTSWIM courses.

A number of NT AUSTSWIM teachers attended the National Conference in Canberra in March. They had a fantastic time and benefited from the large range of sessions offered. We hope to see more Territorians at the conference next year.

Meetings Conducted

Five general meeting and two executive meetings were conducted during the past twelve. One general meeting lapsed for want of a forum.

Courses Conducted

A total of 135 courses were held in July 04 to June 05 period. Of these 101 were TSW, 19 infant aquatics, 5 people with disabilities, 4 teacher of adults and 6 competitive strokes. The total number of candidates was 1381 for the above courses with 356 certificates being awarded til December 04. Re-registrations for the year were 219

During the past year course have been presented at such remote areas as Weipa, Bamage and Bourketown in the gulf region of far north Queensland. In the central western region of the state, AUSTSWIM courses were carried out at Emerald, Longreach, Winton, Wondoan, Goondiwindi and Chinchilla. This branch has always attempted to take AUSTSWIM to the remote areas of the state.

Highlights

AUSTSWIM Queensland Branch once again held a two day workshop at Nudgee College Brisbane in May 05. 210 attended both days of the workshop. The standard of presentations was excellent and especially appreciated by attendees were the presentations involved swimmers in the pool. One attendee travelled from Birdsville with others from many areas of the state. The branch thanks our recently resigned Marketing Manager and our Executive Officer for their programming and organisation of a conference highly evaluated by those in attendance.

Queensland Branch has maintained a steady number of courses throughout the year will attempt to increase the number of candidates availing themselves of AUSTSWIM qualifications. The resignation of the branch President for the past two and a half years and the Marketing Manager for the past six and a half years in early 2005, has meant some restructuring of the administration of the branch. This branch has appreciated the contributions of the above officers. At present all administration is now centred in the one office and has assisted in the day to day interaction between the branch and its clientele and with National Branch. My thanks to all Branch committee members, administration officers and to the executive for their continued assistance.

South Australia

Government Support: It is again with great appreciation we acknowledge the financial support provided by the Office of Recreation and Sport for the continuing provision of AUSTSWIM programs. This support decreased substantially for the 2004/2005 funding year.

Professional Development. We have been offering a variety of clinics to our members in support of their professional development such as Stroke Correction Clinics. We also have been responding to community groups by offering the AUSTSWIM course (and Professional Development opportunities) in country areas, eg Mount Gambier, Port Augusta and Port Lincoln. This has enabled many children to access quality tuition in school swimming programs.

The number of current members on database to 30th June 2005 is 4077.

We have had a decrease in the number of courses provided but an increase in the number of candidates. We have centralised our course venue to a more convenient location as well as offering courses in more country areas.

Re-registrations increased by 11.6% from 03/04. This is obviously due to the mail out of re-registration forms prior to the expiry date.

Victoria

AUSTSWIM National have over the past two years been moving from a Commonwealth based organisation to a One AUSTSWIM (Corporate structure) directed by a national council. In line with this, Victoria has taken a forward approach and formally changed from operating as an independently incorporated organisation to one that is now constituted under the umbrella of AUSTSWIM National. The committee will be responsible for representing Victorian AUSTSWIM certificate holders in the areas of development and education at the National level, selecting State recipients of the various AUSTSWIM Teacher Awards, and also represent AUSTSWIM National at the state level.

The committee, to this time consisting of course providers, will be expanded to include other members of the learn-to-swim community with an interest in the further development of AUSTSWIM courses, resources and professional development.

I believe this move will result in greater efficiency of administration, through a central administration office, consistency and standardisation of procedures and operations in all states, and provide for a wider range of input for development and enhancement of resources. The Aqualife magazine, which allows for a specific Victorian report is an example of what can be expected from this move. All AUSTSWIM certificate holders who wish to contact AUSTSWIM about any matter now have one number to ring wherever they are in Australia and one web site.

This is a good time to reflect on the history of AUSTSWIM which began as VICSWIM. In 1979 the VICSWIM committee called a meeting of representatives from all the Australian states and territories, and the major swimming organizations, which resulted in AUSTSWIM National being formed. Victorians John Gregson (Chairman) and Robert Burrowes (Vic Delegate) were elected on the first AUSTSWIM Council. Other Victorians to sit on the National Council since include Keith McElroy, John Kilpatrick, Len Willmer, Michael Lumley, Clive Patrickson, Geoff Adams, Andrew Whittaker, Ted Tullberg, Ralph Richards and Peter Meaney. AUSTSWIM Victoria was incorporated as an independent body administered by VICSWIM when AUSTSWIM National was formed.

As the present Chairperson I would like to thank VICSWIM (now known as VAIC) for being the administrators of AUSTSWIM Victoria since its inception and being the organization that was the catalyst for AUSTSWIM. I also thank Meredith King (YMCA), Ron Bongetti (Swimming Victoria), Norm Farmer & Warrick Waters (LSV), Andrew Whittaker (VAIC) and Warren Curnow (VAIC) for their assistance and support, especially during the period of taking this decision and following it through.



Western Australia

The 2004/2005 year saw many changes occur within the AUSTSWIM WA office. One of them being the appointment of a new Executive Officer and Course Coordinator in April 2005. The other big change was AUSTSWIM WA moving into new offices.

AUSTSWIM WA continued to deliver high quality courses within the state. 72 AUSTSWIM courses were conducted for 912 West Australians. 757 candidates attended one of our 55 Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety courses, giving us an average of 13 candidates per course (49% of these courses were conducted in country areas, an increase of 9% compared with 03/04 year), showing that WA continues to abide by its charter to provide for all the people of WA, irrespective of distance from Perth.

In April 2005, 17 AUSTSWIM teachers completed presenter training and Certificate IV (in Workplace Training and Assessment) to become an AUSTSWIM Presenter of the Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety Course.

The King Neptune Conference held in October 2004 was again an outstanding success. It saw an overall attendance of 167 over the two days

Australian Swimming Coaches & Teachers Association

ASCTA has continued to represent the aquatics industry, and our coaching and teaching members on the AUSTSWIM National & State Councils, providing input and support where necessary, particularly in resource development.

ASCTA recognises the need for comprehensive swimming and water safety education for Instructors as one of the mechanisms to keep swimming Australia competitive on the world stage and to further reduce the number of drownings or near drownings, making swimming an attractive and safe activity for people to use for recreation or sport.

ASCTA's role as a provider of AUSTSWIM courses to the aquatics industry has been limited this year but we are working to increase our activity in this area in the next 12 months. It is also pleasing that ASCTA and AUSTSWIM continue to mutually recognise the professional development programs undertaken and accredited by each other.



Swimming Australia Ltd

The adoption of the Junior Sport Policy is a major initiative, which is now being implemented nationwide through the State Associations with children being encouraged to participate in competition, with the emphasis on participation and fun rather than winning. This 'culture' change in how Swimming Clubs and the State Associations deal with their most valuable asset – the junior swimmers, will continue to take place during the next 2 years.

As part of the policy and the Strategic directions of SAL, this year sees the introduction of a New Members Kit to be distributed to over 25,000 new members of swimming clubs. The kit which is a result of trial in Queensland last year and also builds on the resources developed in the GO Swim program, contains a back sac, personal best booklet and letter and photograph from Australian team captain Grant Hackett for the new member, and equally important it contains an information booklet and a nutrition guide for the parents of the new swimmers. GO Swim is to remain as our brand name for new members into our sport.

The other major new initiative this year is the introduction of the club development program - GO Club which will provide resources to all our States and Territory to run a series of Club development forums to up skill the Club Coaches and Administrators and also run a series of Come and Try events around the nation. Incorporated within the program is a National Club Standard which enables Swimming Clubs to self evaluate their total effectiveness against a range of criteria and the introduction of an Equipment Grants program which in the first year will see 100 swimming clubs receive essential equipment to compliment their programs and operations.

Swimming Australia's Green License Coaching Courses, which incorporates AUSTSWIM Towards Competitive Strokes, has continued to be extremely popular with over 1000 participants successfully undertaking the course in all states and territories with an even mix of AUSTSWIM teachers and the beginner coaches in a club environment.

Finally Project Connect which is a national initiative of the ASC and the Australian Paralympic Committee that focuses on creating athlete pathways for people with a disability and breaking down the barriers, both disability and non-disability specific, in sport, is continuing with Swimming Australia and AUSTSWIM jointly involved in the program development.







The past year has been extremely productive for Royal Life Saving with many achievements, particularly in the areas of water safety education, aquatic risk management, aquatic research and health promotion. The 2004 National Drowning Report indicated that 277 people drowned in water related incidents. This figure represents an 11% decrease on the five year average which is a pleasing result for all agencies involved in the Australia Water Safety Council.

The Swimming and Lifesaving Manual 5th Edition was released in September 2004. The new manual was well received and features many innovations, including a Companion Website to support instructors and candidates through the Bronze Medallion. Swim and Survive promotion this year focused on "Active Family Fun Days" conducted at Royal Life Saving Endorsed Aquatic Facilities throughout Australia. The concept focuses on encouraging healthy, active and fun participation in water safety activities for families. Further development of the Keep Watch campaign has resulted in a range of new resources including fact sheets and materials translated into Korean, Vietnamese, Chinese and Arabic.

Over the year the partnership between AUSTSWIM and RLSSA has continued to strengthen through productive and positive initiatives. RLSSA has enjoyed being involved in the inaugural National Conference, State conferences, workshops, course review committees and increasing its delivery of the AUSTSWIM program. RLSSA looks forward to continued collaboration with AUSTSWIM. I would also like to thank Penny Flint, RLSSA National Manager – Education and Training for her contributions to these initiatives.

On behalf of Royal Life Saving I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the hard work of the AUSTSWIM Chairman Kirk Marks, CEO Gordon Mallett and the AUSTSWIM team in building a stronger and more responsive AUSTSWIM. We also thank Gordon for his contributions to the aquatic industry during his time with AUSTSWIM.

Surf Life Saving Australia

During the 2004-05 season, Surf Life Saving Australia (SLSA) made considerable progress implementing a comprehensive strategy to reduce the rate of coastal drowning deaths in Australia. This plan, (called the SLSA Total Service Plan) covers four main areas:

- Education on the potential risk posed by a hazard through educational programs such as Telstra Beach to Bush.
- 2. Restricting access to a hazard through implementation of standard signage on all coastal waterways.
- 3. Increased supervision through the extension of lifesaving services.
- 4. Acquisition of survival skills through methods such as 'nippers' and surf education courses in schools.

Every aspect of the potential reason why a person might drown (the 'drowning cycle') is addressed by this plan, with emphasis being placed on the extension of lifesaving services to cover gaps in our current services, and in the development of relevant education resources.

We are currently developing an integrated lifeguard service to supplement our Support Service operations and resources continue to be devoted to developing standard operating procedures and online information, such as incident reporting, a membership database for SLSA members, award processing and patrol statistics. SLSA looks forward to working with Austswim and other members of the Australian Water Safety Goal during the coming year in our efforts to improve water safety in the community.




State Course Statistics






Number of Courses Held during 2004/2005




Teacher of Competitive Strokes Award




Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics Award

Teacher of Aquatics to People with Disabilities Award




State Course Participant Statistics







Number of Course Participants during 2004/2005
