
THE IMPORTANCE OF AUSTSWIM

For 40 years Australasians have been taught to swim by AUSTSWIM trained and accredited Swimming and Water Safety Teachers. With over 350,000 teachers trained since inception, it is likely that each and every person in Australia today has been taught by or knows someone who has been taught by an AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety™. By adulthood over 95% of adults know how to swim and on average visit a pool 4.4 times each year. However, figures published by Royal Life Saving Society – Australia and Surf Life Saving Australia show that 398 people drowned across Australia from July 2018 to June 2019, representing a 10% increase on the previous year. Highlighting that much work is still to be done.

THE FOUNDATION STONE

The skills taught by our teachers are far reaching and enable our Olympians to swim on the worlds stage, they enable lifesavers to patrol our beaches, pools and waterways, they enable social connections, create healthy environments and breed the next generation of swimming and water safety teachers.

At AUSTSWIM we recognise and celebrate the importance of our organisation, and our people as the foundation stone of water safety across Australia. We teach a skill for life!

AUSTSWIM The Story So Far

BRIEF LOOK AT OUR 40 YEARS



HISTORY

AUSTSWIM was formed in 1979 as a result of national and state based aquatic organisations identifying the need to have a national body to oversee the training and accreditation of swimming and water safety teachers.

AUSTSWIM has trained over 350,000 teachers of swimming and water safety since inception over 40 years ago. AUSTSWIM has continued to grow and develop to the changing needs of the aquatic industry and the wider community.






- The first AUSTSWIM course was held in Orbost, Victoria in April 1980 with further courses then taking place in other states and territories of Australia.
- 1985 the first AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety™ training manual released.
- 1987 the first AUSTSWIM Presenter Kit released.
- Later part of 1980 State Branches were formed and incorporated to provide AUSTSWIM training.
- · Increased awareness by the industry for the need to have AUSTSWIM trained swimming and water safety teachers.
- · First life members recognised.

THE 1990's



- AUSTSWIM Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics™ training course and manual released.
- Teacher training videos and interactive CD released.
- Increase in community awareness for learn to swim and water safety programmes.
- · AUSTSWIM training offered into some countries internationally.

2000 and beyond





- Expansion of AUSTSWIM training into international markets.
- AUSTSWIM transition to unified model completed in 2009.
- · 2016 AUSTSWIM takes industry lead and announces the introduction of Working with Children Check (WWCC) requirements for staff, course presenters and candidates, licenced teachers and aqua instructors.
- In 2015 AUSTSWIM became the first aquatic organisation in the world to become ISO accredited to ISO 17024.





THE IMPORTANCE OF A ROBUST CODE OF CONDUCT AND LICENSING SYSTEM

AUSTSWIM is proud to have been at the forefront of the aquatics and drowning prevention industry since its inception in 1979. 40 years on, our role as custodian of swimming and water safety teacher training and accreditation has become even more relevant in an ever changing and more demanding environment.

Ensuring access to quality, accredited teachers and centres for both parents and learners is a critical factor in the success of drowning prevention strategies. This access and the skills they deliver offers confidence to end users and drives participation and retention levels of students in learn to swim programmes around the world. AUSTSWIM's role in swimming and water safety teacher training continues to be intrinsically linked to that of operating a teacher licensing system and building ongoing support of the industry.

This crucial element of AUSTSWIM's work is of critical importance to members of the public and to swim school operators with the AUSTSWIM licence, representing both a message of trust and confidence as well as a message of consistency in the oversight of swimming and water safety teachers and swim centres. It offers reassurance to the public that a robust set of behaviours and rules exist, and that with those behaviours comes expectations and obligations on behalf of our teachers and recognised swim schools. The AUSTSWIM code of conduct underpins this commitment with a set of policies and regulations that set the standards expected.

The AUSTSWIM licensing and accreditation system instils a number of key principles that are underpinned with a disciplinary process that ensures only those that are fit to represent the industry are in possession of this licence. AUSTSWIM is the only aquatic organisation worldwide to hold ISO 17024 accreditation to oversee this certification.

KEY PRINCIPLES OF OUR CODE OF CONDUCT INCLUDE:

Public

• Encouraging public confidence in aquatic education.

Teachers

- Sets expectations of swimming and water safety teachers.
- Robust standards of practice.
- Frames desired conduct and behaviours.

Swim Centres

- Sets standards for customer safety and emergency procedures.
- Specifies class ratios and duty of care obligations.
- Specifies compliance with safe pool operation, and ensures safe and enjoyable aquatic activities.

In addition to the code of conduct all Australian based teachers are fully insured both during and after training for the duration of them holding a licence under the AUSTSWIM master policy offering \$20M of cover.

Chairperson's Report



It is my pleasure to present the 2018-2019 AUSTSWIM Annual Report. August 2018 saw a new CEO, Carl Partridge, commence in the role. His energy, experience in strategy development and implementation, corporate governance, product development and in delivering an exceptional customer

experience and developing high performing teams has been utilised to maintain and strengthen AUSTSWIM's position as the peak body for training and accrediting swimming and water safety teachers, both nationally and internationally.

The AGM in November saw the departure of Gary Shaw and Bill Meaney from the board, the re-appointment of Jonty Mills and the appointment of Graeme Stephenson and Kath Thom.

My sincere thanks to Gary Shaw, who came back on the board in March 2018 to fill one of two casual vacancies. Gary was joined by Jonty Mills and both contributed enormously to the smooth transition to a new CEO. Bill Meaney has been a director since 2011 and his thoughtful insights and expert financial knowledge was invaluable.

In August of last year the Board utilised the services of the Australian Institute of Company Directors to undertake a Governance Review. The recommendations focussed on

a number of areas including Roles and Responsibilities, Board Structure and Composition, Board Appointments and Succession Planning, Board Meetings and Decision Making and Strategy and Risk. The Board has worked tirelessly to adopt the recommendations and in many cases this was a matter of fine tuning processes already in place.

Highlights of the year have been the introduction of a new strategic plan, the continuing adoption of recommendations from the governance review and Swimming New Zealand becoming the sole provider of AUSTSWIM courses in Aotearoa. AUSTSWIM has maintained a sound financial position with the Financial Report showing a small surplus.

I also thank member organisations RLSSA, SLSA, WSNZ, ALFA, YMCA and SAL for their enthusiastic support and the continued guidance, advice and support of the staff of the Department of Health.

Finally, AUSTSWIM would not exist without the enormous support, commitment and contribution by you. To the Board, Councillors, AUSTSWIM Advisory Committee members, teachers, instructors, presenters and their friends and families, my sincere appreciation.

I commend the 2018-2019 Annual Report to you and trust you will be proud of your part in these achievements.

For 40 years, AUSTSWIM has been a world leader in the accreditation and training of Teachers of Swimming and Water Safety, setting the bar for the industry and making a difference to millions of people's lives. In this time the organisation has become known across the globe for its commitment, ingenuity and positive outcomes in drowning prevention.

AUSTSWIM is the foundation stone of swimming and water safety teaching across Australasia having trained over 350,000 Teachers since inception. AUSTSWIM Teachers have created Olympians, and life savers; they have enabled social interactions and improved well-being and mental health through the skills they have taught regardless of location, region, culture or ability to millions of Australians.



The AUSTSWIM accreditation system and code of conduct reassures and protects hundreds of thousands of learn to swim participants annually and builds within trust the swimming community, removing barriers to participation, creating a safer environment.

As the new CEO I have taken on the role knowing that both myself and the rest of the AUSTSWIM family are custodians of a great Australian icon, a challenge we relish.

As such it is my honour to present to you the 2019 annual report and celebrate with you our achievements.

The 2018/2019 financial year was one of consolidation after a period of significant growth for AUSTSWIM and encompassed the conclusion of one strategic plan and the creation and commencement of the next.

I have made it a priority that we gain an improved understanding of, and create a focus around both our internal needs and that externally of our industry ensuring that we are effective and efficient in solving the "problems" that need to be solved. In essence our role is that of positive outcomes and solutions.

Internally our focus has been around 4 key areas that will ensure the organisation has the right foundations to take the next step of what will be a highly exciting and rewarding journey.

INTERNAL KEY FOCUS AREAS

- Our Vision: We have defined what we seek to do and have translated this vision into a reality for our team so they can understand, appreciate, internalise, and commit to doing their best to achieve it.

As we examine our results there is much to celebrate and this years annual report highlights the reach and depth of AUSTSWIM and its relevance to the industry.

2018/19 saw the most successful year in AUSTSWIM's illustrious 40-year history delivering to a record number of course candidates across both metropolitan, regional and remote locations in each state and territory.

A trend indicating significant growth in extension courses has been particularly pleasing as teachers seek to expand their knowledge and skills across the nation.

Overall the AUSTSWIM range of course and development opportunities continues to go from strength to strength across the nation with the number of course candidates 5.4% higher than the same period the previous years.

OUR COMMITMENT TO A GROWING NATION

With over 300,000 children born annually in Australia and population having passed the 25 Million mark the role of a teacher of swimming and water safety has never been more important. The passion and commitment of our teachers ensures that AUSTSWIM continues to play a pinnacle role in facilitating water safety education across the nation with 35,000 teachers currently holding an AUSTSWIM licence.

As a not for profit organisation AUSTSWIM remains committed to offering its courses at an affordable price regardless of geographic location and has, for the 3rd consecutive year, frozen its prices primarily through the development of secondary income streams that offset the full costs of the course.

AUSTSWIM remains focused on delivering courses that exceeds the minimum industry standards and continues to set the bar for the industry and work towards its vision of having every Australasian taught by an AUSTSWIM Licenced Teacher.

With the aid of both federal and state support AUSTSWIM presenters were able to deliver subsidised courses in areas, or to groups that would otherwise not be viable. This critical support particularly targeted remote and Indigenous communities, several of which are highlighted in the state reports.

CULTURALLY AND LINGUISTICALLY DIVERSE COMMUNITIES (CALD)

The 'Youth Swim' project was made possible by the 2018/19 Water and Snow Safety grant. The key focus areas included integration for swimming and water safety lessons in existing programmes and the training and accreditation of AUSTSWIM Teachers through subsidised enrolment in the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety[™] course.



The Greater City of Bendigo in central location manv targeted for its growth, with more 50 different countries of origin represented in the region. Collaboration

with the YMCA (Peter Krenz Leisure Centre, Eaglehawk) and Belgravia Leisure (Gurri Wanyarra Wellness Centre, Kangaroo Flat) together with several multicultural organisations resulted in children of CALD backgrounds immersing themselves into existing swimming and water safety classes.

- "He is in the lessons because it is so important in Australia, we are surrounded by water and more beaches, you should know how to save yourself. I came from North India, far away from beaches, we never had swimming lessons. I started lessons last season here in Bendigo. It was amazing! I was too scared to start with but after 2 or 3 times I was more confident" Youth swim parent.
- "They did so well, so happy with swimming lessons, very much, they like it. They have improved so much. She was not knowing anything before. We came to Bendigo in

Victoria

2016 from South Sudan via Kenya (refugee camp), the girls were born in Kenya. We didn't know about swimming. In Australia we have to do swimming. We want to do more" Youth Swim parent.

"My two sons had the lessons, they really enjoyed it and don't want to miss because of it. It is very important for them to be very comfortable in water. I put my AUSTSWIM Licence on my community Facebook page. They are all so proud of me. I wanted to encourage them to swimming. They ask me how did you learn? How can I join? I think maybe I am the first Indian woman in Bendigo with an AUSTSWIM Licence! Our Community Program is going to be very big this season, I will be helping, teaching them as well. I also have a new job now at the new swimming centre teaching the school groups. It's so nice to see the children, how they are learning, see their smile, the different light on their face, they feel happy. I enjoy working there, making them safe, you don't know when they might need to know what to do, it is an important role in their life" Youth Swim supported accredited AUSTSWIM Teacher and parent of swimming and water safety lessons students.



CULTURALLY AND LINGUISTICALLY DIVERSE COMMUNITIES (CALD)

Targeting members of the CALD communities was a priority for South Australia and was made possible thanks to funding received from the Office of Recreation, Sport and Racing. This funding assisted in further subsidising the total enrolment cost of attending the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety $^{\mathsf{M}}$ course for members of CALD communities wishing to become AUSTSWIM Teachers.

AUSTSWIM Teacher Behzad Pourdarab, is the perfect example of a member of the CALD community who took the opportunity to give up cabinet making for something much closer to his heart – teaching people to swim.

For Behzad, who decided at 21 years of age to flee his native Iran in search of freedom, it was the subsidised funding that made the opportunity to complete the Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety course possible, and he hasn't looked back since.



South Australia

Behzad almost drowned during his journey to Australia, when the ramshackle old boat he was travelling on broke down and he had no idea how to swim. This traumatic experience drove his passion to make a difference to others using this very personal experience to enhance his teachings.

"I'm passionate about teaching because if someone's telling me they're scared, I understand exactly how they're feeling because I have been in that situation," Behz says.

Behz has also gone on to complete the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics™ course as part of the enrolment subsidy funding. This has allowed him to be a part of the new migrant programmes being run at iSwim @ Immanuel where he is now employed as a swimming and water safety teacher and he loves the challenge that comes with the job, "it makes you be creative because you can't talk to all kids the same way and try to teach them the same way, you have to play with it, you have to find out what works for different kids."

REGIONAL ENGAGEMENT

Ongoing professional development is recognised as an important element in ensuring that AUSTSWIM Teachers continue to keep their knowledge and skills up to date with current practice. Under our "equity of access" charter, AUSTSWIM is committed to ensuring that all AUSTSWIM Teachers have access to a variety of education and learning opportunities, regardless of location. Teachers working in regional and remote WA were afforded similar professional development opportunities to their city colleagues.

Goldfields Splash 2018

As part of the WA Collaborative Aquatics Group, and supported by the Western Australian Government, Goldfields Splash 2018, brought together a range of aquatic organisations to promote the benefits of aquatic activities for the community. AUSTSWIM contributed by not only delivering a range of courses, but also through the delivery of regionspecific professional development, particularly targeting CALD communities and the disability sector, through MATEs (Making Aquatic a Terrific Experience) seminar.

Leigh Nugent Visits

Ex-Olympic Coach Leigh Nugent was greeted with much eagerness and excitement as AUSTSWIM took the Leigh Nugent Masterclass to Kalgoorlie and Karratha. It was a privilege for AUSTSWIM to be able to bring an expert of Leighs stature to WA and the impact of the Masterclass will spread throughout the region to the benefit of children participating in swimming and water safety lessons.

AUSTSWIM RECOGNITION

Teaching swimming and water safety provides high school students, school leavers and university students with entry level employment into the Aquatics Industry. Whether this is the first step of a long career in the industry or as a casual job while they study, these students make a valuable contribution to the aquatic industry workforce.

Western Australia

The Western Australian School Curriculum and Standards Authority, in addition to the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety™, has recently endorsed the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics™.

The endorsed courses contribute towards a student's WA Certificate of Education (WACE), with endorsed programmes contributing up to the equivalent of 4 units towards the 20 units they need to complete before the end of Year 12. All endorsed programmes are reported on the student's WA Statement of Student Achievement (WASSA) that is issued at the end of Year 12, whether or not they meet all of the requirements for the WACE. From 2018, students completing this programme can count this learning towards their WACE and have the achievement reported on their WASSA.

This is a great opportunity for students to support their academic pathway but also develop and grow their skills to provide an amazing array of opportunities, including employment.



REGIONAL AND REMOTE COMMUNITIES SWIMMING IN THE DESERT

When you are a school located in the more remote parts of Australia having access to accredited swimming and water safety teachers and quality lessons brings its own challenges, both in terms of access to skilled resources and the cost of delivery. Located 340km southwest of Alice Springs in the community of Yulara or more commonly known as Uluru, Yulara School boasts 45 passionate students willing and capable of developing new skills and experiences.

With assistance from the AUSTSWIM Grant 'Access to Quality Accredited Swimming and Water Safety Teacher Program 18-19', Yulara School was given the opportunity to have 5 of its teachers attend an AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety™ course conducted in Yulara in September 2018.




Recognising the importance of water safety these five teachers successfully went on to attend the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics™ course and further develop their teaching skills in February 2019.

The AUSTSWIM Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics™ course provided the candidates with the competence required to deliver safe and enjoyable aquatic activity programmes for children between the age of six months to four years of age which has allowed the Yulara School to conduct school swimming and water safety lessons with their preschool students. Yulara School has now become a Silver AUSTSWIM Recognised Swim Centre.

INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES

Access to training and development opportunities are especially difficult for members of our communities that do not live in or near a metropolitan area. The impact of both time and cost can be a significant deterrent to ensuring communities have suitably accredited teachers with some courses involving up to 2 days travel by road and plane for our presenters to reach the course destination.

AUSTSWIM, through its Queensland state business centre, recently delivered and subsidised both Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety™ and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) courses to two communities in critical need of swimming and water safety.

- · Located 2,246km North West of Brisbane, Doomadgee has a population of 1,405 and now has 14 school teachers accredited as AUSTSWIM Licenced Teachers enabling school swimming lessons to continue in the community.
- In Weipa, which is 2,471km North West of Brisbane and boasts a population of 3,899, AUSTSWIM also delivered its course to 4 local residents allowing swimming and water safety lessons to continue following the relocation of the previous local swim school operator.



Queensland

CULTURALLY AND LINGUISTICALLY DIVERSE COMMUNITIES (CALD)

Non-swimming adults and adolescents are a significant high-risk group that is over represented when reviewing Australian drowning statistics. AUSTSWIM designed and delivered a "From Fear to Freedom" Professional Development Workshop to address these specific issues aimed at teachers taking non-swimming adult and adolescent CALD community members for lessons.

The Swim 4 Life holiday programme provides equitable access opportunities for ACT children to participate in a variety of aquatic programmes regardless of their background or financial situation.

20 AUSTSWIM Teachers were engaged to deliver the programme to over 490 children which was facilitated through our partner in the ACT – Royal Life Saving Society ACT. Participants aged 4 – 14 learned basic yet essential water safety and survival skills in the 9-day programme that was delivered at Canberra International Sport and Aquatic Centre (CISAC), Lakeside Leisure Centre and Canberra Olympic Pool.

"Swim 4 Life" is the ACT's only structured river/lake-based water safety programme with 50% of sessions delivered onsite at popular local open-water swimming locations. The AUSTSWIM Teachers showed innovation in their ability to take students into real world environments to deliver these lessons.



DEVELOPING THE WORKFORCE -RETURNING TO WORK



Funding from the Office of Sport Strategic Partnership Program and with the support of local swim schools, AUSTSWIM trialled its new 'Return to Work Program'. This ground-breaking project opened a door into the aquatics industry with subsidised training for parents who were looking to return to work after absences for a wide variety of reasons. With the offer of flexible working hours and the opportunity to work while children are at school the aquatic industry is highly appealing to parents providing both a great work/life balance for young families and improving social connections and mental health. The programme provided back to back training for the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety[™] and AUSTSWIM Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics™ course. The courses were modified to run during school hours over one week to accommodate school runs and assist with any childcare that may have otherwise been required. 10 mums took advantage of this opportunity and are now currently enjoying completing their industry training with local AUSTSWIM Recognised Swim Centres.



A GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE

Far too many people around the world know the pain of losing a loved one to drowning. Each year an estimated 360,000 people die from drowning – over 90% of them from low and middle income countries. More than half of these deaths are among those younger than 25, with children under 5 facing the greatest risk.

World Health Organisation (WHO) Preventing Drowning; an implementation guide.

The WHO Global Report on Drowning identifies 10 actions to prevent drowning, one of which is to "Teach school aged children swimming and water safety skills". An important and identified step in teaching children swimming and water safety skills is the selection and training of instructors. The WHO Preventing Drowning; an implementation guide finds that "swimming should be taught by adults who are native speakers; come from the local culture; and are trained and certified in both swim teaching and maintaining concentration and discipline with groups of children – school teachers are ideal."

With a view to supporting locally sustainable programmes AUSTSWIM has partnered with a variety of providers and organisations to deliver world class training and accreditation of local swimming and water safety Teachers and presenters across the globe. In 2018/19 a variety of courses were delivered internationally, either through local partners or AUSTSWIM directly. The training and accreditation of local Swimming and Water Safety teachers is a vital drowning prevention intervention and AUSTSWIM is proud to have been able to work in a variety of locations in 2018/19.
